**Classical Civilization** is the study of the cultures of the Ancient Mediterranean, and in particular the cultures of the Greek and Roman worlds. The study of literatures, classical languages, art, philosophy, political thought and history, as well as how all of these things are received in later periods, offers an ideal insight into the development of many societies of the modern world, providing an indispensable access to many Humanities subjects. Doing Classics means studying fascinating material in its historical contexts, and asking broad social and political questions that can give an insight into the challenges of our current society.

## Skills developed in Classical Civilization

To be competitive in the job market, it is essential that you can explain your skills to an employer. Visit the Career Centre to learn how to articulate and market the following skills:

**Communication:** understand history and development as it applies to nations/groups of people; understand cultural diversity; formulate and defend positions; mediate in disputes and conflicts; listen objectively; and adapt in cross-cultural setting.

**Problem-solving:** cultivate decision-making; reason logically; and think critically.

**Organizational:** apply theoretical knowledge in practical settings (e.g., via internships).

**Research:** develop attention to detail; examine evidence; evaluate ideas and research; gather information and data; and interpret research and data.

## FUTURE STUDENTS

### Admission to UTM

All program areas require an Ontario Secondary School Diploma, or equivalent, with six Grade 12 U/M courses, or equivalent, including English. The admission average is calculated with English plus the next best five courses. The approximate average required for admission is mid- to high-70s. **NOTE:** During the application process, applicants will select the Humanities admissions category, but will not officially be admitted to a formal program of study (Specialist, Major, and/or Minor) until after first year.

Hercules who? Take CLA204H5 and learn about the myths and legends of the Ancient Greek and Roman Mediterranean world in ancient art and literature.

The UTM Classical Civilization program is unique as it focusses not only on Greece and Rome but also on regions these cultures were in contact with, such as Egypt and the Middle East, allowing students to study cultural contacts and cultural change. Courses in Classics thus present solid grounding in material that is indispensable for the understanding of many other Humanities subjects and society in general.

Our program provides training in core skills, such as close reading, analytical thinking, and the formulation of strong arguments. All of this not only makes learning about the ancient world fun, but also offers a crucial foundation for the study of any other subject, and for any professional career.
