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Course Description

This course considers concepts of normal, abnormal, and delayed development. Classification schemes and diagnosis, approaches to identification of causes, and contemporary treatment methods are critically evaluated. The emphasis is on controlled research as a primary source of knowledge about psychological disorders and treatment.

Course Evaluation

There will be a short paper assignment, a final paper, mid-term test and final exam.

The short paper is worth 10% and due by 3:10 pm on Jan.21, 2016 the third class. The final paper is worth 20% and is due by 3:10 pm on March 24, 2016 the second last class. The midterm is worth 30% and will take place on Feb. 11, 2016 during the sixth class. The final exam is worth 40% and will take place during the exam period. The exam period is from April 11-25 2016. It is the student's responsibility to be available for the entire exam period.

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignments will be discussed in class. Handouts will be provided for each assignment. Please check blackboard.

1)First Assignment -Short Paper-10% due on Jan.21 at 3:10 pm in class.

Describe an ecological approach to disorders in children and adolescents.

Students will describe an ecological approach to disorders in children. Discuss the topic using examples from peer reviewed literature. One should include at least 3 peer reviewed articles. Lecture notes and the course text may not be used as references. Papers must be one page in length plus references. Writing extending one page will not be marked.

2)Term Paper-20% due on August 12 at 3:10 pm in class.

Discuss a disorder in children and adolescents.

Choose one disorder that is apparent in children or adolescents. Use nosological, developmental and ecological tools to describe the disorder. Refer to assessment tools and treatment options. Ensure that your ideas are backed up by peer reviewed literature.

Students will describe one disorder using the tools discussed in class. Describe the characteristics of the disorder. Discuss the presentation of the disorder for a specific age group. Refer to normal development at this age and discuss how the disorder might interfere with developmental tasks. Describe the ecological influences on the approach to the disorder, including the impact of diverse systems on interaction with the child. Refer to the possible affect of the disorder on the family and vice versa. Describe assessment tools and treatment options.

This paper is to be 5 pages in length double spaced with 12 point font plus reference pages. Writing exceeding the allotted 5 written pages will not read or marked. Students should include at least 6 peer reviewed references. There is no limitation on pages allotted for references. Lecture notes and the course text may not be used as references.

Mid-term test and Final Exam

The tests will be comprised of the readings and material taught in class including lectures, discussion, exercises and videos. Not all of the material covered in the text will be covered in class. Lectures will include material not covered in the text. Students are responsible for all material covered in class and readings. The midterm will include material from class 1-6. The final exam will include material from class 7-12. The test is not cumulative however, material taught in the first part of the course is relevant for the second half. Students are advised to review notes from lecture 1-6 for the final exam. Tests will include multiple choice and open questions requiring critical thinking of the material and an analysis of case scenarios or clinical vignettes.

Missed Test Special Consideration Request Process

Students who miss a test due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. illness or an accident) can request that the Department grant them special consideration. Students must present their case to the Department (NOT the Instructor) by submitting a request via the online Special Consideration Request form at: https://utmapp.utm.utoronto.ca/SpecialRequest.

Students are to submit original supporting documentation (e.g., medical certificates, accident reports, etc.) to the Psychology Academic Counselor or drop it in the drop box located outside the Psychology office, Deerfield Hall, 4th Floor. Students have up-to one week from the date of the missed test to submit request. Late submissions will NOT be considered without a letter of explanation specifying and documenting the reasons for the lateness. .

Medical certificates or physician's notes must be completed by the Physician and MUST include the statement "This Student [name] was unable to write the test on [date(s)] for medical reasons". This documentation must show that the physician was consulted within one the day of the missed term test. A statement merely acknowledging a report of illness made by the student to the physician is NOT acceptable. If your request is approved by the department, the value of the test will be redistributed to the final examination.

Extension of Time Special Consideration Request Process

Students who seek to be granted more time to complete their term work beyond the due date without penalty, owing to circumstances beyond their control (e.g., illness, or an accident), must do so by submitting a request directly to the Instructor for the period up to and including the last day of the term. The decision as to whether or not to apply a penalty for the specified period rests with the Instructor.

Students who seek to be granted more time to complete term work beyond the last day of the term must submit their request directly to the Department. This request covers the period following the last day of classes and ends the last day of the exam period. This is done by submitting a request via the online Special Consideration Request form at https://utmapp.utm.utoronto.ca/SpecialRequest.

You are advised to seek advising by the departmental Undergraduate Counsellor prior to the deadline.

Original supporting documentation (e.g., medical certificates, accident reports, etc.) must be submitted to the Psychology Academic Counselor or dropped off in the drop box located outside the Psychology office Deerfield Hall, 4th Floor. Students are expected to submit requests to the Department before the last day of the term, unless demonstrably serious reasons prevent them from doing so. In the event of an illness, medical certificates or doctor's notes must confirm that student was ill on the due date of the assignment (for a one-day extension). For a longer extension, documentation must specify the full duration during which academic work could not be carried out.

Penalties for Lateness
