# **Course Description**

This course is designed to follow PSY230 (Introduction to Personality) and/or PSY240 (Introduction to Abnormal Psychology). It assumes a working familiarity with the major theories of personality and/or psychological disorders. We will cover the most influential theories of psychotherapy of past and present, and how they are integrated and applied in modern practice. This will be accomplished through lectures, in-class activities, and the assigned text. The lectures and in-class activities will build upon the assigned readings, so please read them in advance.

- Understand the ethical issues present in counselling practice and how to deal with them
- Compare and contrast the major psychotherapy perspectives
- Analyse and critique the major theories in psychotherapy
- Explain how empirical findings support or refute the major theories of psychotherapy
- Apply the major theories of psychotherapy to case studies
- Apply the key concepts and techniques of psychotherapy to your own personal life
- Explain the role of diversity issues in the therapeutic relationship

## Missed Test Special Consideration Request Process

Students who miss a test due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. illness or an accident) can request that the Department grant them special consideration. Students must present their case to the Department (**NOT** the Instructor) by submitting a request via the online Special Consideration Request form at: https://utmapp.utm.utoronto.ca/SpecialRequest.

**Important note**: Once the test/exam is available online and you're unable to write or have an approved request to miss, **DO NOT** at any point attempt to access the test/exam. If at any time you access the test/exam, you will **NOT** be able to submit a special consideration and/or your request will be refused.

If your request is approved by the department, a make-up test will be offered. You will receive an email when a make-up date has been arranged. The department will try to give 2-3 days notice of make-up date, however sometimes this is not possible. **Be prepared for the make-up.** 

### **Extension of Time Special Consideration Request Process**

Students who seek to be granted more time to complete their term work beyond the due date without penalty, owing to circumstances beyond their control (e.g., illness, or an accident), must do so by submitting a request **directly to the Instructor** for the period up to and including the last day of the term. The decision as to whether or not to apply a penalty for the specified period rests with the Instructor.

Students who seek to be granted more time to complete term work beyond the last day of the term must submit their request directly to the Department. This request covers the period following the last day of classes and ends the last day of the exam period.
