

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
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

Admission Statistics – Canada (CPA, 2009)

- Experimental: 5 to 40% (M = 24%)
- Clinical: 0.74 to 17% (M = 9%)
- Counselling: 8 to 27% (M = 21%)

Admission Statistics – US

(Norcross, et al., 2010; Norcross et al., 2003)

- Experimental: M = 37.6%
- Clinical:
 - Practice-oriented: M = 16%
 - Research-oriented: M = 7%
 - Psy.D: M = 26 to 50%
