# Job Search in Spring 2020 for the International Student

Looking for work can be challenging during the best of times. Recent events (including the COVID 19 situation), has made things much more difficult. #### 1. Take Care of Yourself

### **Physical Health**

- Listen to the health experts
- Engage in <u>social distancing</u>
- Exercise (where possible)
- Eat well
  - o Grocery stores are still open, and online grocery delivery is available
  - o Restaurants and delivery apps can offer no-contact food delivery to your door

#### **Mental Health**

- Reach out if you need any help
- Stay up to date on the current situation (both in Canada and in your home country) but give yourself a break from social media it can be overwhelming!
- Stay in touch with friends and family through the means available (phone, text, online chats)
- Find fun and distracting activities
- Access your Student Support Program (SSP) in your language of choice

## 3. Immigration, Study Permits and Post-Graduation Work Permits

New information is coming out every day regarding the Government of Canada's response to the current situation and how it impacts immigration, study permits and post-graduation work permits. We recommend checking the following sources to keep up to date regarding your status and working in Canada.

### 4. Researching Careers and Opportunities

Considering your options? You can learn a lot about careers online which will help as you reach out to employers. Here are a few recommended resources:

- My World Abroad you can create an account with your University of Toronto email in order to access profiles on countries and schools abroad.
- Reviewing profiles of University of Toronto Alumni on LinkedIn. From your LinkedIn account
  search for the University of Toronto and select "school". On the left-hand tab you will see a link
  to alumni, and you can conduct a search to see career paths of over 300,000 U of T alumni. If
  you need information on setting up your LinkedIn, check the <u>LinkedIn page</u> on the Career Centre
  website.

#### 5. Updating Your Job Search documents (Resume, Cover Letter, Portfolio, Work Samples)

Did you know that the average employer spends 6-7 seconds the first time they review your resume or cover letter? To stand out from the competition, it's critical that you create tailored, accomplishment-based resumes and cover letters. Check out the <u>UTM Career Centre toolkit</u>.

Also, certain industries may require more than just a resume and a cover letter. For example, software developers may need a Github or a good portfolio of passion projects. An animator in the animation industry may require an online portfolio.

  employers not only your interest in the industry of your choice, but also your skills and aptitude.

#### 6. Building Your Conversations and Networking

One of the best ways to learn about careers and find out about opportunities is to reach out to professionals in the field. By conducting <u>information interviews</u>, you can get up to date career and industry information.

#### **Meeting New People**

There are several excellent resources to help you find professionals in your field with whom you can have a conversation remotely.
