COURSE TITLE: Detective Fiction

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will study the evolution of the Detective Fiction genre from Poe and Doyle to postmodern variants of the genre by Paul Auster and Julia Kristeva. Along the way we will examine one of Agatha Christie's most accomplished mysteries; Japanese detective fiction by Edogawa Rampo, featuring master detective Kogoro Akechi and criminal queen the Black Lizard; hardboiled detective narration by Raymond Chandler's Philip Marlowe; a Chicago detective story featuring Sarah Paretsky's Violet Warshawski; and Janet Evanovich's Chick Lit detective Stephanie Plum, in her debut appearance.
