Course Title: Studies in Theatre and Drama 2: Intermedial Theatre and Performance

Course description: Contemporary western culture is increasingly defined by its fascination with new media technologies. The challenge for theatre practitioners in this surging climate is one of navigation, strategy, and intention. New media -- as with all large-scale technological developments -- exert subtle and profound influences on perception, comprehension, imagination, and creativity. This course is intended to explore those influences in order that as theatre practitioners and audiences we can better recognize, understand, scrutinize, exploit, and celebrate them. The course introduces students to a range of histories, ideas, theories, speculations, assertions, and strategies – both conceptual and practical -- relating to the existing and potential roles of media in performance practice.
