

Course Description: A theoretical and historical study of the relationship between live and recorded media, with special consideration of the translation/adaption from theatrical production to film and television production. Topics of discussion will include the nature of performance, the processes and apparatuses of representation, the dramaturgical strategies available within adaptation/translation contexts, and the complex social and industrial negotiations between media within contemporary cultural economies. The course will be structured in relation to a series of case-studies, and class time will be divided between screenings/viewings, lectures, and structured discussion.
