Course Title: Privacy in American Literature

Course description: What is privacy? Whose interests are served by it? What kinds of people and places are associated with it? Who invades it and how? What is its relationship to publicity? Is it the same thing as secrecy? Is it indispensable to dignity? Can – and should – it be protected? By whom, how, and to what end?

These questions preoccupied American literature over the course of the long nineteenth century; not coincidentally, perhaps, the period would end with a landmark essay locating a new right to privacy in intellectual property law. This course will explore relations among personhood, property and privacy in nineteenth-century U.S. literature.
