
Off-Campus Housing

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Things to consider when searching for off-campus housing

Use the headings below to think about and consider what you want vs. what you need when looking for off-campus housing. For example, if you're planning to live in Toronto and have a vehicle to commute to UTM, then a parking spot becomes a *need* and you'll have to ensure the places you are looking at have that available.

- » **Commute** how long will your commute to school be? Are you within close proximity to a bus stop? GO Train? Subway or other form of public transit?
- » Furnished vs unfurnished do you have your own furniture already?

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- » Laundry is there a washer/dryer in the unit? In the building? If in the building, is it a Coin-OP, or free to use? Do you have to go to a laundromat? How far is the laundromat from your accommodation?
- » Utilities what utilities (water, hydro, heat) are included in the monthly rent? What about internet?
- » Parking is there a parking spot included? Is it indoor or outdoor?
- » Housing type are you looking for a basement unit? House? Condo? Apartment?
- » Roommates are you looking to live alone? Or with roommates?
- Amenities are there grocery/convenience stores nearby? What about restaurants? Retail shopping? Entertainment, like movie theatres? Fitness facilities? Public parks/trails?
- » Neighbourhood is the neighbourhood safe?

Glossary of Terms

- » What is a tenant? A tenant is an individual who pays rent in return for the right to occupy a rental unit
- » What are tenant rights? As a tenant in Ontario, you have legal rights. These rights are explained in the <u>Human Rights Code</u> and the <u>Residential Tenancies Act (RTA)</u>
- » What is a landlord? A landlord is the owner of a rental unit (house, apartment, condo)
- » What are landlord responsibilities? Landlords must ensure that the rental unit complies with rules and regulations and that acceptable standards are met throughout the duration of a tenancy

Tenant Rights

- » Be provided with the <u>Ontario Standard Lease</u> from your landlord. Never sign a lease without reading and understanding it thoroughly. If you have questions, ask before you sign
- » Be free from discrimination and from being treated unfairly because of race, nationality, religion, age, sex, disability, sexual orientation, etc.
- » To have security of privacy
 - » Your landlord must give you written notice of at least 24 hours before entering your rental unit

Tenant Responsibilities

- » Pay your rent, in-full and on time
- » Have contents insurance
- » Keep your house/space clean
- » Notify your landlord of any damages caused or maintenance issues

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» Honour the terms of your lease

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Landlord Rights

- » Collect a rent deposit
 - » Can only be used for the last months' rent of the lease term
 - » Cannot be used as a damage or cleaning deposit
- » Collect monthly rent
- » Increase rent annually

Landlord Responsibilities

- » Keeping the home in good repair
- » Providing access to vital services
- » Providing you a copy of your written lease agreement
- » Other as spelled out in the lease

COVID-19 important notes

- » During this time, your landlord has been encouraged to request entry into your unit/home only in urgent situations and to follow <u>physical distancing guidelines</u>. They must still provide 24 hours written notice, state what day and time they will be entering, and the reason for entering.
- » During this time, it is still a tenant's responsibility to pay their rent, in-full and on time. If your finances have been impacted due to the COVID pandemic, consider <u>applying for government funding</u>, as applicable. It is encouraged that you work together with your landlord to establish fair arrangements to keep you in your home.
- » If you are house hunting during this time and would prefer to go see a unit in person, ensure you are taking steps and precautions to reduce the risk of transmission and to protect yourself e.g. wear a mask and gloves, do not touch surfaces in the home, maintain distance between you and homeowner, etc.
- If you are house hunting during this time and would prefer to see a unit virtually, ensure the landlord takes you through the home live on FaceTime or Zoom (sending photos might not be enough).
 Communication with a potential landlord can all be done virtually, including signing a lease. When it is time to move into a rental unit, meet with the landlord outside of the home/building to exchange keys for the deposit. Do not deal in cash use cheques or e-transfer only so there is record of the transaction.
- » If you are house hunting during this time and want professional help finding and securing a space, consider using a property management company.
