Department of Language Studies

The Language Teaching and Learning program is specially designed to provide a comprehensive study of how languages are taught and learned, whether in a second or foreign language context. The programs develop expertise in the areas of pedagogy and language skills development, psycholinguistics and language acquisition, bilingualism and multilingualism, sociolinguistics and cross-cultural communication, and teaching and learning. Certain courses focus on the teaching and learning of particular languages, while others are not language specific.

#### **Admission to UTM**

All program areas require an Ontario Secondary School Diploma, or equivalent, with six Grade 12 U/M courses, or equivalent, including English. The admission average is calculated with English plus the next best five courses. The approximate average required for admission is mid- to high-70s. More information is available at

**NOTE:** During the application process, applicants will select the Humanities admissions category, but will not officially be admitted to a formal program of study (Specialist, Major, and/or Minor) until after first year.

#### **Sneak Peek**

What's the best way to teach language? In FRE225Y5 you'll examine different teaching approaches (behaviourist, audio-visual, communicative, cognitive and humanistic). Curious about the structure of French? Take FRE272Y5 to study the phonetics, phonology, syntax and semantics of modern French.
