South Asian Humanities offers a comprehensive exploration of South Asia and the South Asian diaspora (South Asian peoples and cultures around the world). It draws on a range of disciplinary approaches. Through diverse course offerings, students can study South Asian history, religion, politics, languages, societies, and cultures. The program is geared toward building an engagement with the South Asian region as well as with South Asian diasporic contexts. Students may take courses in several departments that focus on South Asia. As a complement to the students' other chosen programs, the Minor in South Asian Humanities can prepare students for careers in a competitive global context in which South Asia plays an important role.

Admission to UTM

All program areas require an Ontario Secondary School Diploma, or equivalent, with six Grade 12 U/M courses, or equivalent, including English. The admission average is calculated with English plus the next best five courses. The approximate average required for admission is mid- to high-70s. More information is available at in the **Viewbook**.

NOTE: During the application process, applicants will select the Humanities admissions category, but will not officially be admitted to a formal program of study (Specialist, Major, and/or Minor) until after first year.

Sneak Peek

How do we approach the extraordinary diversity of South Asian religious history?
