Department of Language Studies

Linguistics is the scientific study of language, a broad field encompassing topics such as the internal structure of language, how infants and adults learn and process language(s), how language is used to express identity and interact with one another, and commonalities and differences among languages of the world. Our programs in Linguistics provide a strong foundation in the core aspects of language structure: sounds (phonetics and phonology), words (morphology), sentences (syntax), and meaning (semantics), as well as the social functions of language (sociolinguistics) and language processing (psycholinguistics). Upper-year courses allow students to apply their foundational knowledge to deeper research in these areas and others, including how language changes over time, language documentation, how people use language in context, close study of the structure of specific language(s), and how languages are learned and taught. Students also have the opportunity to learn skills directly applicable to careers in language technology, speech-language pathology, second language teaching, and outreach/community work.

The career you choose will depend on your experience and interests. Visit the Career Centre to explore your career options.

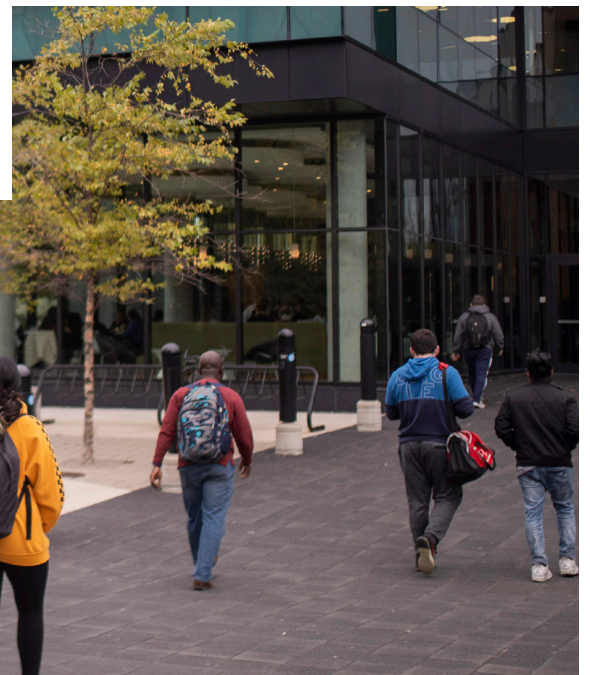
Careers and workplaces for graduates:

Skills developed in Linguistics

Knowledge of linguistic structure and how language is used in society is directly relevant to careers in clinical fields, language technology, language pedagogy, and language-related community or outreach work. In addition, courses in Linguistics programs develop the following skills that are transferable to many other career paths. Visit the Career Centre to learn how to articulate and market these skills to future employers.

Technical: knowledge of the abstract structures of language; cross-language similarities and differences; how humans learn, produce, and process language; how languages change and vary.

Research: working with written and spoken language data; collecting data via elicitation, experimental methods, or corpus research.

Analytical: qualitative and quantitative data analysis techniques; critical thinking and logical argumentation; applying knowledge of language to applied fields.

Communication and interpersonal: knowledge of how language is modulated in different social contexts; communicating complex information to a variety of audiences; awareness of and respect for linguistic and cultural diversity.

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FUTURE STUDENTS

Admission to UTM

All program areas require an Ontario Secondary School Diploma, or equivalent, with six Grade 12 U/M courses, or equivalent, including English. The admission average is calculated with English plus the next best five courses. The approximate average required for admission is mid- to high-70s. More information is available at utm.utoronto.ca/viewbook.

NOTE: During the application process, applicants will select the Humanities admissions category, but will not officially be admitted to a formal program of study (Specialist, Major, and/or Minor) until after first year.
