Course Description

Intensive study of social attitudes and opinions development, description, measurement, modification, and organization. This course explores theories of how attitudes are formed, how they influence our behaviour, and how they can be influenced and changed. Specific topics include but are not limited to: attitude measurement, stereotypes and prejudice, dissonance, persuasion and advertising.

IMPORTANT COURSE POLICIES

We all come to this course with a unique perspective that encompasses a variety of experiences, responsibilities, needs, and interests. I practice a "whole learner" approach to instruction, which honours that we all learn differently and at different paces, and all learners in our class (myself included) are people with outside lives that will both inform and possibly sometimes interfere with this class. As such, the course policies below offer options for seeking extensions. These policies offer flexibility, but also ask for accountability. Both are integral to creating a productive learning experience for our entire classroom community.

Missed Test Special Consideration Request Process

Students who miss a test due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g., illness or an accident) can request that the Department grant them special consideration. Students must seek approval the Department (NOT the Instructor) by submitting a request via the online Special Consideration Request form at: <u>https://utmapp.utm.utoronto.ca/SpecialRequest.</u>

Important note: If you sit down and receive a test, you will NOT be able to receive special consideration.

If your request is approved by the department, a make-up test will be offered. You will receive an email when a make-up test date has been arranged. The department will try to provide 2-3 day's notice of the make-up test date; however, this is sometimes not possible. Be prepared to write the make-up test with less than 2 day's notice.

Extension of Time Special Consideration Request Process

Our due dates in this class are not arbitrary, and ideally all work should ideally be submitted by the specified due dates. The course's pacing is designed to help you make steady and productive progress toward the learning objectives. Additionally, your course instructor and TA have deadlines for which we need to return and submit your grades, which means there are limits on the length of extensions.

If you need an extension, please submit a request 24 hours in advance of the due date using the form posted in quercus (see course website for details). You don't need to submit proof that you need extra time, fill out the form with your request for a revised deadline and the date on which you are able to submit. The instructor will follow up to either approve or request more information within 48 hours.

Students who seek to be granted more time to complete term work beyond the last day of the term must submit their request directly to the Department. This request covers the period following the last day of classes and ends the last day of the exam period. This is done by submitting a request via the online Special Consideration Request form at <u>https://utmapp.utm.utoronto.ca/SpecialRequest</u>. You are advised to seek advising by the departmental Undergraduate Counsellor prior to the deadline.

Supporting Documentation

The University is temporarily suspending the need for a doctor's note or medical certificate for any absence from academic participation. However, you are required to use the Absence Declaration tool on ACORN found in the Profile and Settings menu to formally declare an absence from academic participation. The tool is to be used if you require consideration for missed academic work based on the procedures specific to our campus/department.

Missed Final Exam or Extension of Time beyond exam period

Missed final exams or for extensions of time beyond the examination period you must submit a petition through the <u>Office of the Registrar</u> and follow their procedures.

Penalties for Lateness

A penalty of 10% per calendar day (i.e., including weekends and holidays, during which students are not able to submit term work) up to and including the last day of classes, will be applied to any work not submitted at the specified due date unless an extension has been requested (using the form posted in Quercus) 24 hours in advance of the due date. After the last day of classes, the penalty of 10% per calendar day will be applied by the Undergraduate Counsellor on behalf of the Department. No penalty will be assigned if request for special consideration, described above, was successful.

- 1. Falsifying institutional documents or grades.
- 2. Falsifying or altering any documentation required, including (but not limited to) doctor's notes.

Academic Rights

You, as a student at UTM, have the right to:

- Rely upon a syllabus once a course is started. An instructor may only change marks' assignments by following the University Assessment and Grading Practices Policy provision 1.3.
- Refuse to use turnitin.com (you must be offered an alternative form of submission).
- Have access to your instructor for consultation during a course or follow up with the department chair if the instructor is unavailable.
- Ask the person who marked your term work for a re-evaluation if you feel it was not fairly graded. You
 have up to one month from the date of return of the item to inquire about the mark. If you are not
 satisfied with a re-evaluation, you may appeal to the instructor in charge of the course if the instructor
 did not mark the work. If your work is remarked, you must accept the resulting mark. You may only
 appeal a mark beyond the instructor if the term work was worth at least 20% of the course mark.
- Receive at least one significant mark (15% for H courses, 25% for Y courses) before the last day you can drop a course for H courses, and the last day of classes in the first week of January for Y courses taught in the Fall/Winter terms.
- Submit handwritten essays so long as they are neatly written.
